

# FASTI LADIES of the finest breed

If Thursday is "Ladies Day at the Car Wash" (when any gal of driving age officially qualifies for free wax with wash, then August 19 is hereby proclaimed "Ladies Day at the Track"—qualifying all daring damsels to free thrills and spills with entry. This unique breed dates back some thirty-plus years to the 1940's, when adventurous women like Patti Hulse raced Velocettes, B.S.A.'s and Matchless 500's through the Santa Monica mountains. Of course, the outfits weren't quite as elaborate as they are today—many simply donned a shirt, rolled-up jeans and sneakers—but the racing was just as serious! (By the way, Patti still rides for fun today…and if ever there's a Pioneer class at the Nationals, you can be sure she'll enter.)

Through the years, women continued to uphold the theory that women could conquer any course that a man could. But the real turning point in women's racing came in 1968 when about twenty girls converged on the starting line at the famed Hopetown Grand-Prix. Although it does not sound like a big turn out, it was a significant number to arrouse the interest of other females. From there, the enthusiam (and entries) have just grown and grown.

A handful of lady cyclists have taken the sport even further into other facets of riding and racing; such as Jan Ditson, one of the pioneers of the desert. As well as Lynn Wilson, who now owns and operates a motorcycle accessories business. Lynn and Mary McGee Formed the first all woman team to ride and finish the Baja 500. McGee later paired up with Cherry Stocton to become the first female team to finish the grueling Mint 400.

In September of 1972, a group of Southern California racers, female that is, were invited to Canada as part of the Can Am series. Unoffically, this was the introduction of women's racing to Canada.

Also in the early 1970's, Kerry Kleid became the first woman to earn an AMA professional license. While daredevils Debby Lawler, the Flying Angel, and Teri Kezar, second Women's National Champion, dazzle crowds by jumping their motorcycles over cars.

More recently, three local experts teamed up to ride in Evil Knivel's show in Australia. Sue Fish, Dawn Grant and Madylin. Almeida were called the Danger Angels, entertaining crowds with long-distance jumps and endless wheelies.

Stuntwoman Marcia Holley, a familiar face at local races for many years, set a land speed record for the single-engine streamliner motorcycle class last year. Piloting Vesco's Kawasaki "Lightning Bolt" KZ1000, Marcia dialed in two runs at 228.397 and 230.326 mph for a 229.61 average. In doing so, she also became the first woman to break into Bonneville's elite 200 mph Club.

Contributing to the recognition of women's racing in a big way was racer and promoter Kasey Roger's, who instigated the First Women's Nationals in 1974 at Indian

Dunes. She also was instrumental in establishing an Invitational Women's class at the 1975 Oly Superbowl of Motocross...the first truly internationally important women's event, which saw Sue Fish walk away with the honors, and the \$200 purse!

Teresa Martin and Debbie Reon were among the first women to venture into speedway racing. While Diane Cox is currently the only woman holding an expert AMA license for flat track racing. And in roadracing, Carter Alsop is the only female who has earned an AMA pro license.


Trials rider and stuntwoman, Debby Evans, has awed many a spectator with her skill and expertise. She is also the only American woman to hold an expert classification in trials, representing the U.S. in the Scottish 6-Days Trials,


One of the first ladies to race in Europe was none other than first "Powder Puff Grand National Champion" Nancy Payne. Maico sponsored her 6-week jaunt, and she made a rather impressive showing at the local races (which previously had been exclusively male attended).

The second Grand National Champion, Arizonan Teri Kezar, gave Southern Californian locals quite a surprise at the 1975 Nationals. Back home, Teri established an impressive track record against the pro guys. Now she's retired from racing to pursue an even more exciting cycling career--ramp jumping!

The next two Women's Nationals, '76 and '77, saw a close battle between two close friends, Sue Fish and Johanna Stenersen. Both years though, Sue edged out Johanna. However, there was always question as to whether Sue would have taken the title if Johanna would have ridden the 250 Grand Prix (her sponsor prohibited Johanna from riding due to an old knee injury acting up).

In May of 1977, Butch Lee held the First Women's Invitational World Championships at Cycleland in San Antonio, Texas. Sue Fish took home the overall, although she encountered some stiff competition from Rhe Helms, who took first overall in the 125 GP.





At last year's Nationals, the two-time champion looked like she was going to take the title for yet a third year. Sue Fish dominated the 125 and 250 Grand Prix events on Saturday. In the second day of racing, Sue again had a tremendous lead when disaster struck. Coming off the big jump on the treacherous Carlsbad downhill, her suspension gave way as she laded...both rider and bike cartwheeled again and again. Surprisingly, Sue escaped with no broken bones, but suffered badly pulled ligaments in both her shoulder and ankle, as well as a whiplash.

With Sue out of the running, the attention now focused on a four-way battle for the title. It was right down to the last moto as Carey Steiner edged out Dede Cates, Rhe Helms and Roxie Klatt for the overall win. Ironically, Carey, Dede and Rhe had finished second, third and fourth appropriately in the '77 Nationals, Thus, in 1978, each moved up one place.

In this year's Women's Invitational class at the famed Mammoth Motocross, Carey again the win (along with a champagne-filled trophy and kiss from the trophy-guy, Joe Root.) All through the race though, Dede was hot on Carey's rear knobbie; followed closely by Rhe (whose bike was suffering from the altitude).

All three will be in fierce competition again today, too. Unfortunately, Roxie (rated 4th at last year's Nationals) will not make it out this year as duty literally calls...she is in the service! While 5th-place Trudy Beck has been going strong in local desert events and has her eyes set on the title, too.

Sue Fish's dissapointment in loosing her title has extended to this year's Nationals as well. Her shoulder and ankle were recently operated on (to tighten ligaments injured in the '78 crash). Sue will be participating in today's event in a new role--co-announcing the expert division-ideal with her special familiarity with the top competitors.

Rounding out the field of experts will be several hot contenders from out of state, including Kathy Holman from Texas, Barbara Speilman from Indiana and Kay Attwood from Calgary, Canada (Kay ice races!).

Kathy "Holeshot" Holman lived up to her nickname in GNC's Women's Invitational class at the Houston Astrodome last March. Twenty-four ladies from all over the nation qualified, riding the same track that the top professionals had conquered the night before.

All in all, experts, amateurs and novices alike, will be putting on one heck of a show today. Afterall, this is the Nationals. This is the one that really counts. The supreme example of excellence in women's racing.

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#### CAREY STEINER

Current holder of the prestigious number one plate in women's national racing, Carey's goal today is to secure it for still another year. After winning the title at the 1978 Women's Nationals, she decided to quit racing, only to be persuaded by her sponsor to ride the Great Bear Grand Prix at Riverside last April. Even though she was sadly out of practice, Carey not only won the women's division, but finished 28th overall out of some 300 riders. After that, she knew that she could never give up racing.

Carey again proved her ability by winning the Women's Invitational class at this year's Mammoth Motocross, (Although a little shy in accepting her champagne-filled trophy along with a kiss from the trophy guy!)

Carey's consistently smooth style has also made her a top contender in many grand prix races, such as her recent 2nd place finish with the guys at Corona. When asked what it takes to be

a national champ, she responded with praise for her sponsors. "If it weren't for Danny Martinez at Western Wheels, I wouldn't be out her today. His support encouraged me to continue racing... and winning!" Carey also receives support from MXL Goggles, R&G Auto Dismantaling, D&J Racing and KRW Helmets.

#### DEDE CATES


Whatever advertising agency created the slogan "number 2 tries harder" must have seen Dede race. Her agressive power-on-to-the-max-all-the-time style has earned her the respect of many of the intermediate men racers she competes with (and usually beats) almost every weekend. Now 18, this vivacious blond started racing minibikes at 13 (earning enough points in CMC to ride with the expert boys).

At the 1977 Women's Nationals, Dede finished third overall. Last year, she got off hard in the 125 GP, dropping her in points. She came back in the 250 GP though to take third...6th

in the 125 motocross and first in the 125 MX.

Today she'll be riding a Q&E prepared 125 Suzuki and a works 250 from American Honda. As one of the few factory supported riders here today, she definitely is one of the top contenders for the title.


#### RHE HELMS

As one of only two women to ever place in an ISDT Qualifier, Rhe was the first to win a Bronze medal (at this year's California City event). She's spent most of this season competing against the 125 Intermediate guys... averaging 7th overall. Although during the past few weeks, she took a 3rd in CMC Carlsbad MX, and a 4th in night racing at Corona.

When she does ride with the gals, she usually wins! At Anaheim Hi-Sider's Gran Prix, she not only took first woman, but finished 10th overall with the expert guys (note: the women started almost 5 minutes after the guys)

At GNC's Astrodome race last March, Rhe was challenging the first place rider when her bike seized. She also encountered bike probs at Mammoth MX and Great Bear GP, but still pulled out third place finishes.

Ranked third fastest woman at last year's Nationals, this year she's more determined than ever! And with the help of her sponsors, Torco Oil, Champion Spark Plugs, Scotts Suspension and Yamaha of Covina, she can do it!





#### PAULINE PITT

This petite 24-year old won the 250 amateur class at the '77 Nationals to finish 4th overall, prompting her to move up to expert. In last year's expert class, she was a consistent contender, keeping the leaders in sight...yet never quite in reach. Pauline has definitely come a long ways since her first Nationals in '76, where she rode a street-equipped 175 Enduro to the Dunes, removed the lights at the track, and took 6th 250 Novice.

Injuring both knees last December, she is still in therapy—working out every day. Pauline says she'll be in full force though at this year's Nationals. Sponsored by Wheelsmith Motorcycles of Fountain Valley, Greg Smith will wrench on her 125 Suzuki and 250 Maico.

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

#### KATHY HOLMAN

Nicknamed "Holeshot Holman", Kathy demonstrated her starting specialty at last year's Nationals. A broken bike put a dampener on her overall finish though. Of course, 6th overall for a newcomer to racing was nothing less than terrific. (Kathy had been racing less than a year!)

At GNC's Astrodome MX, Kathy easily won the women's class, lapping half the field in just six laps. Since there are few women's racer in Houston, were Kathy lives, she regularly competes with the expert guys. In fact, Kathy just qualified in the top ten at the Texas regional (encompassing two states) to ride NMA's National in Oklahoma.

Just turned 16, Kathy keeps in shape by playing soccer and works out faithfully at Nautilus. Sponsored by Rose-Rich Yamaha, her goal is to get her pro license...and to win this year's Nationals!



#### DORENE PAYNE

Whether she's crossing it up on a motorcycle or a motocross bicycle, this 14-year racing wiz is right at home on the track. Dorene won the Senior Women's division at the World Championship BMX. She's also the 3-year Pals NBA Grand National Champion as well as an ABA Grand Champion. Dorene has won 300 trophies in the last 3 years of bicycle racing, which has taken her all over the U'S., and to Japan!

Racing motorcycles off and on for 7 years, her first race saw mud racing at its best, but she still managed to take second both days of racing. In fact, it seems that Dorene trophies almost every time she races.

Recently, she appeared on an episode of CHIPs, doing her thing on bikes. She's scheduled to do still another show sometime in September.





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#### DEBBIE (LUTZ) MATHEWS

On and off the track, racing is second nature to Debby. She works in the parts department of Tri City Kawasaki. And, she's promoted women's racing at Saddleback in conjunction with the regular Saturday racing program. Just a few weeks ago, she won the women's class at Saddleback, too! Debby was also president of her high school MX team which competed in the 1975 and '76 series at Orange County International Raceway.

Racing over five years now, Debby moved up to expert after taking fourth overall amateur in the '76 Nationals. At last year's Nationals though, she encountered bike problems in both grand prix events, but finished well in the motocross contests.

This year, she is privateering once more after loosing factory support last April.

#### TERI BENDER

Celebrating her 18th birthday yesterday, Teri can't think of a nicer present than to win the title this year. Racing since 1973. Teri has the skill and experience to do it, too.

At Carlsbad, back in 1975, she made beating Sue Fish look easy. She was all of 13 then, yet her aggressive riding style was very evident. A perfect example of this is the '75 Nationals where she fell running 3rd 125 expert in the GP, only to work her way up from last place to finish 7th out of 36 riders.

Then her luck changed drastically. Teri broke her foot in the '76 Can Am Series, her wrist in a GP at Corona, and cracked a couple of ribs in San Antonio (dicing with the Fish for the lead in the GP). At the '76 and '77 Nationals, her bikes broke. An injured knee kept her from riding las year's Nationals. At the '78 Dirt Digger's Pioneer Town, Teri holeshotted the women's class and lead until her bike broke. Likewise, she lead the Mammoth MX this year until she had a slight disagreement with a "rear-hub-eating-rock".

Bender is confident that today is going to be her lucky day! Her sponsor, Malcolm Smith Products, hopes so, too.





Since its beginning in 1963, the Desert Daisy's Motorcycle Club's membership has included some of the best evolution riders in the desert. Such as Dawn Grant (number one in District 37 two years in a row and competitor in the Gaja 1000, now turned stunt woman), Jan Ditson (pioneer of the desert) and Kathy Anglin (women's number one plate holder the first year of District 37's women's division).

During the past four years, the club rules have been liberalized to include both active and non-racing members. Their first sanctioned event was in 1970...as novel as its name, The Daisy Lace Chase, This year they're calling their hare scrambles a Bunny Scrambles: incorporating the Playboy bunny on posters, finisher pins even race outfits,

Still the only all women's desert racing club in existence, the Daisies also alforded the first recognition of women's desert racing via the movie, On Any Sunday. Members are also featured in the soon-to-be-released movie, Dirt.

Today, The Desert Daisy's M.C. helped organize a resert rider's class since the grand prix was not financially feasible this year. Thus, the gals that are not as familiar with cornering have a chance to strut their stuff, too.

All entrants are condially invited to their race next weekend, August 26, and trophy presentation September 28.

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



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
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
